

As we examine with a lens of shared vulnerability, our aim will be to create a space of safety and curiosity to investigate the roadblocks to showing up for each other and all children in our care. The journey of deeper thinking using key relational concepts from an interdisciplinary perspective will encourage us to analyze our viewpoints and consider the "why" and "how" we show up.

# Listening To And Welcoming Newcomer Children

This workshop/versation circle aims to highlight importance of listening to and valuing children's stories who have migrated from other places - particularly their process of developing their identities in a new country. By sharing the stories, narratives, and factors that have impacted four children in relation to their identity development and sense of belonging in Canada, my hope is to emphasize the ethical, political, and societal need to listen to culturally diverse children, especially from minority groups. Moving away from monolingual approaches, I intend to share, and open to and engage in conversations about multiple strategies used by educators to welcome and support newcomer children in developing a cohesive and meaningful identity that fosters immigrant children's well-being and sense of belonging. Strategies experienced by educators can also support them in creating an inclusive, reciprocal, equitable, and responsive environment for newcomer children.

# Let's Talk About Touching

Victoria CCRR and ECEBC are proud to offer an inperson Educator Training opportunity at the Victoria Child Care Resource and Referral office. This training is for ECEs, Primary Teachers, and other professionals who work with children.

Let's Talk About Touching (LTAT) is a program that supports children's learning about Personal Safety and Body Awareness and was designed to increase abuse resistance skills in children. Developed by the Early Childhood Educators of BC (ECEBC), this program is tailored for children aged 0 to 8 years. Its implementation across Early Learning and Child Care programs, as well as in Primary school settings, has established LTAT as an essential resource for Early Years Educators.

The program underscores the importance of body autonomy, educating children on their rights to have control over their bodies, who touches them, and how they are touched. It helps them to differentiate between safe touches and not safe touches. LTAT introduces the six-body safety rules that give children some beginning skills to protect themselves: by understanding their body belongs to them, by saying "no" or "stop", getting away, and the encouragement to seek help by confiding in a trusted person.
